General anesthesia is associated with a higher risk of severe hypertension and dysrhythmias. 112 In an animal model, acute cocaine intoxication and general anesthesia also resulted in myocardial ischemia. 113 Long-term cocaine use is associated with a increased sensitivity to inhalation anesthetic agents, whereas acute toxicity may increase the requirement for anesthetic agents. 114
