Global higher education access targets are likely to be missed, according to a study that found that women are at the back of the queue when university enrollment widens in the developing world. An analysis

of higher education participation rates in 35 countries in South Asia and sub-Saharan Africa by University of Cambridge researchers detected "extremely low" rates for people under 25 in almost all of them: below 10 percent in 31 of the countries, and below 5 percent in 20.

Developing countries can't rely solely on their own financing for education - there's also a need for more foreign aid. Only 20% of aid for education goes to low-income countries, according to the Global Partnership for Education (GPE). But it costs an average of \$1.25 a day per child in developing countries to provide 13 years of education.
